ANN HOBAN was born in Melbourne, but completed her B.A. (Hons) degree in Music at Adelaide University in 1975. She has conducted Graduate Singers in two previous concerts, the first a major undertaking in the Adelaide Town Hall in 1978 when works of P.D.Q. Bach were featured and the second, a Chamber Concert in Edmund Wright House. She has also conducted the Adelaide University Choral Society. Ann is the Publicity Manager of The State Opera of S.A. and recently studied the marketing of opera with companies in America and Europe.

ALAN HODGSON is well-known to most South Australians as a former senior announcer with the Australian Broadcasting Commission. As well as reading the news on A.B.C. television he specialised in the presentation of music programmes. He has taken part in Adelaide Symphony Orchestra performances of Honegger's <u>King David</u> with Sir Bernard Heinze, Beethoven's <u>Egmont</u> with Ezra Rachlin and <u>Peter and the Wolf</u> with Elyakum Shapirra. He describes his four favourite hobbies as "music, theatre, music and music!"

GRADUATE SINGERS was formed in February, 1977. As its name suggests, the group consists largely of graduates of various Australian Universities who have sung with undergraduate choral societies. A diversity of talents and interests within the group results in a willingness to perform a wide variety of music. Presentations to date have included The Seasonings, a pseudo-baroque work of P.D.Q. Bach, a concert of 20th century European music and a concert of English music which featured Byrd's Mass for 4 Voices. Conductors have included Jon Draper, Carl Crossin and Joannes Roose.

The music for this afternoon's presentation has been drawn largely from the Elizabethan period and the late 19th and the 20th centuries; hence the Romanticism of much of it. So too, of the poetry. It will be noticed that, even in the 20th century pieces, descriptions of the seasons have been more commonly written in the Northern Hemisphere, this being most obvious in Winter and in the two 'May' madrigals in Spring. Therefore the poem January, one of three Australian poems chosen, almost appears out of place in Summer. We would also point out that the East madrigal with its first line of 'Why are our Summer Sports so brittle?' was written in England in 1618, and has nothing to do with the performances of recent Australian cricket teams.
